f you were in the audience at Dance Place for Heat a couple of years ago, then you know Keith Hennessey is not afraid to incorporate his gay activism and concern about the AIDS epidemic into controversial, often shocking pieces.

This month, the dancer-choreographer returns to Dance Place, along with colleagues Patrick Scully and Ishmael Houston-Jones, for a new, no less controversial piece, titled *Unsafe/Unsuited* (A High Risk Meditation). It is a disturbing look at the dangerous liaisons gay men seek out in the shadow of the epidemic.

The piece is primarily based on the form of dance called contact improvisation, with interpolated dialogue, but one issue central to most contact improvisation pieces—trust—seems to have all but disappeared.

While their movements are occasionally playful and even seductive, most of the time the three men, sometimes naked, hurtle into space, with little or no interest in being there to catch each other. They engage in spitting

contests, wiping the saliva off one another, and at times seem determined to inflict hurt.

Hennessey, from San Francisco, and Scully, from Minneapolis, are both co-founders of dance companies—CONTRABAND and Contactworks, respectively— and are involved with alternative performance venues. Houston-Jones, who regularly performs and teaches in New York and specializes in improvised dance, has collaborated with artists in many other fields such as filmmaker Julie Dash

(Daughters of the Dust), and photographer Robert Flynt; he even makes an appearance in the John Sayles film The Brother from Another Planet.

Unsafe/Unsuited, whose aim is described as "to identify queer contributions to contact and improvised performance," was originally commissioned by the Jerome Foundation and Minneapolis' Walker Art Center and has been seen at P.S. 122 in New York, Jump-Start in San Antonio and Diverseworks in Houston.
